Session activities will include self-guided circles, deep dives into hot topics, and practical exercises to strengthen participants' restorative skills.

As staff return to school communities, they will be asked to manage complex schedules, including online and in-person instruction, address the increased needs of students and families, and manage shifting resources while balancing their own households, health needs, and possible grief due to the loss of loved ones. Restorative practices are dialogue-based processes that center a community on equitable and inclusive relationships of trust. understanding, and collaboration. These practices. includina communitybuilding circles, are trauma-informed and provide ample opportunities for socialemotional learning for students, school staff, and families. Join us to explore how to use restorative practices to provide mental health and wellness supports and promote socialemotional learning. Participants will practice

and plan community-building circles and other restorative strategies for in-person and virtual settings and understand how these practices integrate with and support existing mental health and social-emotional frameworks, such as Multi-Tiered System of Support.

Special Education & Restorative Justice

Restorative justice is a philosophy and approach rooted in indigenous traditions for building community and responding to harm. Schools worldwide are extending this tradition and applying restorative principles to manage classrooms and create inclusive, socially connected, and supportive learning environments. We are committed to educating youth regardless of their social, emotional, physical, or intellectual abilities. In fact, students with special needs and trauma make a significant part of our school population and are disproportionately represented in school

discipline cases. Even with no formal diagnosis, students have different capacities for sustained attention, social awareness, intellectual cognition, emotional regulation, memory, and expressive and receptive language. This session will help participants identify and accommodate these differences as an essential part of preparing for, keeping, and following up on responsive interventions, such as responsive circles.

According to the U.S. Department of Education, a positive school culture fosters safety; promotes a positive academic, disciplinary, and physical environment; and encourages trusting and caring relationships between adults and students. As schools and communities work toward a common vision of improving school climate, how can schools organize high-quality systems and practices to create consistent outcomes? Join us to examine how restorative justice fits into the Multi-Tiered System of Support (MTSS) framework. Participants will learn how to align practices to the three-tiered framework, use teams to increase efficiency and make data-based decisions, and integrate

restorative and MTSS practices to provide support for ALL students.

R.E.I.D. stands for Race, Equity, Inclusion, and Diversity. This session will examine the impact of racism, inequity, and exclusion on the learning environment. Participants will be trained to develop safe spaces to have courageous conversations using the restorative justice circle process. Circles have their roots in Native American, Aboriginal, African and other indigenous traditions. They prioritize equity, relationship building, sharing, and listening. Connecting in a circle allows for communicating, healing, and genuinely understanding experiences and dynamics around systemic racism and its connection to equity, inclusion, and diversity. Join us to explore culturally relevant pedagogy and discuss key concepts, including systemic racism, bias, prejudice, and more.

Restorative Responses to Behavior (Part 1*)

This session will build your capacity to practice a restorative response to behaviors in school. Through a restorative lens, participants will explore various techniques and strategies to effectively communicate with students when they disrupt community norms or expectations. Participants will gain skills and tools to deescalate students in heightened situations using restorative communication, including affective statements and restorative questions. Throughout the workshop, facilitators will demonstrate the concept of fair process, an

inclusionary practice that allows staff and students to be actively involved when there has been harm to the community. Participants will consider their biases in their responses to student behavior and recognize how those biases impact consistent outcomes.

When students have the freedom and opportunity to co-create their learning experiences, they are more likely to remain engaged, participate in learning, and develop healthy relationships within the school community. Join us as we examine the intersection of restorative justice and Universal Design of Learning, a framework to improve and optimize teaching and learning for all people based on scientific insights into how humans learn. Participants will consider how restorative

practices support engagement, representation, action, and expression of all K-12 learners in the school community.

Responsive Circle Implementation

Learn how to incorporate responsive peacemaking circles into your classroom and community. This session will focus on responsive circles and the structured intervention for severe and complex incidents of harm. Participants will engage in mock disciplinary scenarios to practice a responsive circle; discuss preparatory meetings, mock circles, and written agreements; and review re-entry processes. Throughout, session facilitators and participants will share feedback to enhance skill development. Throughout the session, participants will explore the intersection between responsive circles and the D.C. Student Fair Access to School Act.
